With arts programs being curtailed at area schools, Paramount has stepped up so our community can be a place where dreams can become reality...where the dynamic energies of kids can find expression...where children can imagine the wonders that arise from human inspiration. Through the creation of our Broadway and Beyond Children's Fund, Paramount acknowledges and understands that young people are the future of the arts.

On January 12th, we saw a glimpse of the Fund's potential, as sixteen school buses—carrying over 1,000 students, teachers and chaperones-lined Galena Boulevard. For many of the students on-board the buses, this was their first time experiencing the magic of live theater.

Among this crowd was Arriyah, a 5th grader at Dieterich Elementary, who wants to grow up to be a singer. "I've never been to a fancy place like this before. Usually,



kids don't have enough money to see [theater] and coming here lets us have this experience" she exclaimed. "It is fun for students, and it makes us happy. I can see myself singing on this stage in the future."



"With the last few years of not being able to do fieldtrips, the students are just thrilled to have this kind of experience." Carolyn Frer, a teacher at Krug Elementary, shared, "The idea of opening their eyes to types of careers they can have in music and acting and design is really important."

As we set our sights on the future, donor support will continue to help schools offer these experiences to their students by providing limitless opportunities for children and adults alike, to experience the arts in-person.

The Paramount Theatre Endowment

Paramount is excited to announce that the Board of Directors of both the Paramount Arts Centre, Inc. and our long-time partners, the Paramount Arts Centre Endowment, approved a merger of the two non-profit entities at the end of 2022, and thus established The Paramount Theatre Endowment.

The original Paramount Arts Centre Endowment was founded by community leader and arts advocate Anne Goldsmith. She, along with a dedicated group of volunteers, formed the organization in 1983. In recent years the Endowment has been guided by Arlene and Dick Hawks, Bernie Weiler, Gina Santori and Joy Titiner.

For many years the two organizations operated side-byside to support the ongoing educational, charitable and cultural activities produced by the Aurora Civic Center Authority, more commonly recognized as the Paramount Theatre, Copley Theatre, RiverEdge Park and Paramount School of the Arts.

What does this mean for the future of Paramount? Now, together as one, our goal is to significantly grow the unrestricted endowed funds to support and serve the programs and initiatives of the Paramount Theatre and Aurora Civic Center Authority, ensuring our longevity for generations to come. We are supported in this endeavor by our partner, the Community Foundation of the Fox River Valley, who will continue to serve as the administrator of the fund.
